I, BRIAN SCHEPENS, the Deputy Director of the Savannah River Acquisition and Project Management Office, declare the following:

If the Court were to vacate the November 2020 SRS EIS ROD and enjoin construction of the Savannah River Plutonium Processing Facility (the "Project") while NNSA prepared additional NEPA analyses (which could take approximately 18 months) these significant disruptions would follow:

- 1. The completion of the Project would slip by at least five (5) years, further frustrating Congress's command to produce 80 pits per year by 2030 (50 U.S.C. 2538a, as amended), and imperiling the national security mission to maintain a dependable nuclear arsenal;
- 2. Roughly 1,400 people who have been hired to work on the Project would immediately be

terminated. Moreover, given the significant delay to re-hire (up to two years), the ill-will

associated with a mass layoff, and the uncertainty of additional potential litigation (which

could lead to additional delays and additional potential layoffs), contractors and

subcontractors working on the Project will lose the knowledge and expertise of many

employees who were carefully selected to work on this critical mission. The loss of this

human capital will detrimentally impact both design, construction, and production;

3. To stop and re-start the Project would cost the American taxpayer approximately three

billion dollars (\$3,000,000,000) more than the current estimated costs to complete the

Project.

4. To stop and re-start the Project would also adversely impact the local, regional, and

national economies by roughly six and a half billion dollars (\$6,500,000,000); and,

5. NNSA would face the reimbursement of significant litigation costs for the termination of

existing employment and construction contracts, including the cancellation of

approximately \$1.5B in subcontracts. Many of these subcontracts are small business

manufacturers across the United States, whose continued existence may be threatened if

the existing subcontracts are terminated and not reinstated for almost two years.
